Final Exam

The final exam will be cumulative and will cover all course material, including the lectures, reading, assignments, material posted online, laboratory theory and student presentations. The exam will be two and a half hours in length.

Labs

Students are expected to attend all labs and to submit a lab report for all labs. If you miss a lab because of an emergency or sickness, you must contact the instructor no later than the next business day; you must submit a MSAF and make alternate arrangements to do the lab. Failure to do so will automatically result in a grade of 0 for the missed lab.

Reports are due one week after completion of the laboratory work. Reports submitted late without a suitable explanation will incur a penalty of 15% per day, including weekends and statutory holidays. Students are expected to have prelab exercises completed prior to attending the lab. Students need to do an online quiz one day before the lab.

Departmental Policies

Students must maintain a GPA of 3.5/12 to continue in the program.
