# 5. LEARNING OUTCOMES

- 1. Identify the operating characteristics of the Ontario power grid.
- 2. Derive modelling parameters for overhead transmission and distribution lines and underground cables.

- 4. Perform large scale AC load flow analysis using PSSE.
- 5. Perform 3-phase balanced/unbalanced distribution system load flow analysis using OpenDSS.
- 6. Perform active and reactive power control.

# **AUTHENTICITY / PLAGIARISM DETECTION**

Some courses may use a web-based service (Turnitin.com) to reveal authenticity and ownership of student submitted work.
